






our children with their reading. UKFAST did just that, they donated a whopping £250 to the school so Mrs Izon spent it all on books!

What is the Summer Reading Challenge?

The Summer Reading Challenge is a challenge for children to read six library books (or more) over the holidays. It runs from 4 July until 17 September in all Manchester Libraries. It is a great opportunity to share and talk about books as a family and to celebrate your child's reading achievements. Joining a Challenge is a great way to keep motivated too! Every year there is a great theme and this year it's science and innovation. With the help of your child's school, Manchester Libraries are inviting children to come along and join up – and it's all free!

When children join the Challenge there are free gifts and after reading six books they receive a medal too!

How does your child join?

- Sign up for the Challenge at your local library from 4 July
- Your child will be given a special Gadgeteers collector poster
- Read at least six library books and collect stickers and rewards
- They receive a certificate and medal when they finish it's fun and totally free

And if they're not already library members, it's easy to join – just go along to your local library or head online at <u>www.manchester.gov.uk/libraries</u>. You could join too – it's all free and there are no fines! Our 22 Manchester libraries have a great selection of books, and you can borrow books online too.

When your child completes the Challenge (by reading 6+ books), they will be entered into a prize draw to win vouchers and books. There is also a book review competition to win a Kindle Fire and book bundles.










Probably most children (and adults) in our school will know and love a book written and illustrated by Anthony Browne.



Do you have a favourite? Click on the book covers to hear them read aloud...







Watch the tree change with the seasons as each page is turned in this beautiful and educational picture book for curious young minds. Through a hole in the book's cover, an owl invites you inside to meet a majestic tree and all its forest inhabitants during the changing seasons. With clever peekaboo holes throughout, each page reveals a new set of animals playing and living in the tree--baby bears frolicking in the spring, bees buzzing around apples in the summer, squirrels storing nuts in the fall, and finally the lone owl keeping warm during the winter chill--until another year begins....



You will love seeing a new set of animals appear and then disappear as each page is turned, and along the way they'll learn about the seasons and how a forest and its inhabitants change throughout the year.

In this section Miss Johnson will share some brilliant books that are linked to geography.






<u>The Rhythm of the Rain</u> by Grahame Baker-Smith

Talk about what other shapes do you know? Who might be hiding? How would you know what shape it was?




Key Stage 1
